Dear Members and Friends of the Orchestra,

As usual, I have the privilege of sharing some highlights from our orchestra's last season with you.

We kicked off the season with what has become a tradition: a concert at the Everett Mall for their annual "Trick or Treat" event. This concert was conducted by our rehearsal conductor, Nsé Ekpo, who did an amazing job not only directing the music but also engaging the audience in the most charming way. It was a true joy to watch, despite, or perhaps also thanks to, the kids jumping up and down right behind the orchestra!



Our mission is to bring free concerts to the community, and we were thrilled to do that during the holiday season at the end of the year. The Orchestra performed at not one, but two venues: the Carl Gipson Center and Cascadian Place. I'm particularly grateful for our concertmaster, Jean DeWitt, who stepped in at the last minute to conduct these performances. Thanks, Jean!

Meanwhile, in the fall, the Snohomish County Music Teachers Association organized a concerto competition. One of the awards for the young pianists participating was the opportunity to perform with an orchestra. At our concert in early spring, we featured Annie Shen as our soloist. I personally really enjoy conducting orchestral accompaniments, and working with Annie was a wonderful experience!

For our season finale, we once again presented an eclectic mix of pieces, this time exploring themes of myth, travel, and the celestial sea. In addition to music by Bedřich Smetana, Claude Debussy, and Gustav Holst, the program included lovely pieces by composers who are not performed as often: Augusta Holmès and Edmond Dédé. Bringing our audiences closer to the music of composers from underrepresented groups is an essential part of our programming, and I look forward to sharing more music like that in the future. Finally, we were joined again by my good friend and colleague, Luke Fitzpatrick, who charmed everyone with his rendition of Sergei Rachmaninov's "Vocalise."



As if this weren't enough for a season, we organized one more concert in July of 2023, titled "...and the Livin' is Easy!". It featured lighter, summertime music, and it was a wonderful time to share with the audience.

We also earned an amazing recognition this past season: ECO received the Mayor's Arts Award as an "Organization Making a Difference"! We were genuinely thrilled to perform at the ceremony, with the whole orchestra on stage. We even had a lighting cue in the middle of the piece, so that the lights changed as we played the music! I was really excited about that little element of our performance!

As usual, I want to thank a number of people for making our mission a reality. I am thankful to all the board members for their continuing work; to Don Wilson, our librarian, for keeping up with all the music distribution (and conductor's last-minute requests!); to Gwen Parker, for her relentless work as the executive director; to our rehearsal conductor, Nsé Ekpo, whom we wish all the best in his new endeavors, and again to Jean DeWitt for stepping in to conduct the holiday program.

This season we are embarking on new adventures and expanding our horizons. I can't wait to share with you all the music we have in store!

Dear Members and Friends of the Orchestra.

To make a difference. Isn't that what we all want? To receive an award recognizing the difference we've made? Icing on the cake!

Please indulge me as I take a moment of pride – and gratitude - for the part I've played to help build this "Organization Making a Difference." Actually, serving ECO was the least I could do: the warm welcome and

encouragement I received from Marcin and orchestra members made a tremendous difference in my life, at a time when I needed it the most.

"Music can lift us out of depression or move us to tears – it is a remedy, a tonic, orange juice for the ear. But for many of my neurological patients, music is even more – it can provide access, even when no medication can, to movement, to speech, to life. For them, music is not a luxury, but a necessity. " - Olivers Sacks, best-selling author, physician and professor of neurology.

Following the stock market implosion of 2008 - 2010, my 20-year career in the financial services industry imploded as well. Some of you can probably relate. Many people lost businesses or homes and saw their savings slashed during those years.

"Of all of the things I've lost, I miss my mind the most." - Mark Twain

Worst of all, symptoms of anxiety, depression and bipolar disorder, which I had been successfully managing for decades, (with medication, counseling, and by the grace of God), were exacerbated. I became paralyzed, couldn't work. After a two-year wait period, I began receiving disability benefits – and vowed that I was never going to put myself "out there" again, not risk failure, not risk being hurt.

In 2014 family members found out about ECO and encouraged me to join. I'd picked up the clarinet when I was in my 50's, studied for a few years, then set it aside. I'd never played in an orchestra before. I was terrified, but one Tuesday I showed up at rehearsal and had the great fortune to sit next to fellow clarinetists – and founding ECO Board members – Kim Dailey and Vonnie Jenkins. How welcome, how valued they made me feel!

Tuesday rehearsals became the highlight of my week: Marcin's smiling face as he conducted, the fun, the laughter, the camaraderie. Even when I played badly, there was never a look of disapproval in Marcin's eyes. (With his friendly, down-to-earth nature, sometimes I think we all forget how exceptional Marcin is, what a rare privilege it is to make music with someone of his caliber.)

Not long after joining the clarinet section, I realized that my business skills could be put to use in service to ECO and joined the Board. Soon I was drafting our first grant application to the City of Everett, with the late, great founding Publicity Chair Myrna Overstreet at my side. Basking in her smile of approval made the words fly faster as I wrote the narrative. Her warmth and friendship are among my many ECO treasures.

So many great moments and memories come to mind as ECO has grown and expanded our outreach. So many stories from other musicians of all ages and skill levels who have not just grown musically, but have also found healing in the joy of making music together.

What was it that made a difference, enabled me to take a risk, in spite of paralyzing fear?

Yes, it was the music - but not just that.

It was the people who made ECO a safe place to make music, a safe place to fail, a safe place to succeed.

It was using the business skills I've gained over a lifetime to advance the Orchestra's mission, collaborating with wonderful people like Myrna and ECO's multi-talented Bassist and Treasurer Chris Hartzog. They gave me the confidence to step out again, promoting ECO through connections with other organizations and arts supporters in our community.

It was the word of encouragement from one of you when I really needed it, or even a hard-to-hear but necessary truth from a trusted friend when I said or did some bonehead thing. (Like the time Kim gently informed me that my pants had been unzipped while I was making rehearsal announcements in front of the orchestra. Good to know for future reference.)

It was laughing with our amazing rehearsal conductor, Nsé, who called me his friend, gave me a lovely thank-you card and dubbed me ECO's "Problem-Solver-in-Chief."

Those are the things that made a difference, enabling me to step up and solve problems when obstacles threatened ECO's future. Those are the things that provided scaffolding when internal obstacles I've struggled with since childhood threatened to knock me off my feet.

With this, my final executive director annual report statement, I urge my orchestra family to think of my story and remember: we never know how hard it may have been for the person sitting next to you to pick up an instrument, or even summon the courage needed just to leave their house that day.

The joy of making music is healing, but it might be your smile or a kind word that makes all the difference, the thing that makes ECO a safe place. A harsh word could do the opposite.

As long as members continue to welcome, encourage and inspire, the Orchestra will keep making a difference in our community at large, and in the lives of so many individuals - sometimes in profound ways we can't even begin to imagine.


Presented our first full concert season since the pandemic, returning to some venues, performing for the first time at others:

Lee is a virtuoso harmonica player, former member of the popular crossover group "War" and co-composer of the song "Low Rider." Lee will be performing with the orchestra in our 2023 fall concert, featuring three

original pieces written by Lee and arranged for harmonica and Orchestra by Marcin.



Everett Chorale: ECO's collaboration with the 80-voice Chorale began in early 2023 and is culminating in a combined December 2023 performance at the Everett Performing Arts Center - including a performance of Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus"!

MAYOR'S ARTS AWARD

The Wendts and 2022 Mayor's Arts Award Ceremony "An Organization Making a Difference!"

ECO was nominated by a community member, endorsed by the Cultural Arts Commission, and selected by Everett Mayor Cassie Franklin as a recipient of one of five prestigious 2022 Mayor's Arts Awards presented at a ceremony held on June 23rd at the Everett Performing Arts Center (EPAC). The only thing missing was the red carpet.

The evening began with an elegantly prepared social hour, followed by a warm welcome and introductory remarks, including congratulations from Mayor Cassie Franklin.

ECO was the first award recipient. The presentation started with a brief interview video in which Maestro Marcin and others from the ECO family talked about the impact of the Orchestra. The video included pictures, videos and background music from past ECO performances. This professional video, created by talented and dedicated City of Everett staff, is available on ECO's "Past Events" web page.

After the video ended, Marcin and Gwen came on stage to receive the award presented by Everett Cultural Arts Commission Chair, Aaron Alonso.

Then the curtain was raised for the big reveal: there was the Orchestra! ECO was the "opening act" at the awards ceremony! A few delightful "oohs" and "aahs" of surprise filled the air. Although entertainment was provided by many Everett performers during the evening, there was no written program listing them. It was clear audience members didn't expect to see a full orchestra on stage.

Following instructions from Marcin, lighting technicians changed color schemes on the background screen behind the orchestra. A mix of subdued shades gave way to brighter and brighter color patterns, in tandem with the swelling moods of Stravinsky's "Berceuse and Finale" from The Firebird Suite. ECO soloists and the entire ensemble played well. The thunderous and triumphant ending of the Finale was met with enthusiastic applause. A fitting tribute to ECO's triumph of being recognized as An Organization Making a Difference.

This is a tremendous honor, one we share with all of you, our faithful friends, donors and members, so... Thank you – and congratulations to all in the ECO Family who help us make a difference!





OUR CONDUCTORS

Marcin Pączkowski is a composer, conductor, digital artist and performer, working with both traditional and electronic media. As a composer, he is focused on developing new ways of creating and performing computer music. His pieces involving real-time gestural control using accelerometers have been performed worldwide, including Daegu, Korea, Seattle, Washington, Ashland, Oregon, Toronto, Canada, and Kraków, Poland.

As the Music Director of Evergreen Community Orchestra, he presents concerts of diverse repertoire to local communities. He is involved in performing new music and has led premieres of numerous works in Poland and the United States. His conducting performances with the Inverted Space ensemble include Anahit by Giacinto Scelsi, featuring Luke Fitzpatrick on violin, Flurries by Brian Ferneyhough, and Hermetic Definition by Joël-François Durand. He is also active in the Seattle-area improvised music community performing on various instruments.



He received grants and commissions from Seattle Symphony, eScience Institute, Adam Mickiewicz Institute, and from Polish Institute of Music and Dance. He received his Ph.D. in Digital Arts and Experimental Media (DXARTS) from the University of Washington in Seattle, Washington. He also holds Masters' degrees from the Academy of Music in Kraków, Poland, and from the University of Washington.

REHEARSAL CONDUCTORS



Nsé Ekpo enjoys a varied career as a performer, educator, and content creator throughout the United States and abroad. He received his Doctor of Music Arts in Orchestral Conducting from the University of South Carolina upon completion of his document, Expanding the American Canon: The Orchestral Music of Black American Composers. Dr. Ekpo joined ECO's conducting staff during our 2018-2019 season, serving as our primary rehearsal conductor through the 2022-2023 season when needed.

The members of ECO rejoice with Nse' and his family (but grieve for ourselves!) as they move back to their home state of South Carolina, where he has joined the Music Department faculty at the prestigious Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities.



Jean DeWitt received her BA in Education at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma in 1982 and has completed graduate level coursework at Seattle Pacific University. In her many years of teaching in school districts throughout the Puget Sound area, she has taught music to students from kindergarten to high school and conducted school orchestras in rehearsals and performances. Jean was the interim conductor for ECO's predecessor orchestra, the Music Hall Orchestra, and has served as concertmaster at many of our performances.

ABOUT ECO

Evergreen Community Orchestra (ECO) is an ensemble that provides an opportunity for musicians of all ages, backgrounds, and ability levels to participate in the joy of making and sharing music.

Since our founding in 2014, ECO has been actively engaged in presenting free concerts throughout Snohomish County. We believe that everyone in our region should be able to access and enjoy live orchestral music as part of an appreciation of the arts.

ECO's initial membership was made up of 25 musicians. In recent years over 50 musicians have participated each season. Currently, our members range from tweens to folks in their eighties. Some are working to develop or brush up their skills, while others have played professionally in the past. There are no auditions, and ECO's teaching conductors work to ensure that each musician feels supported and valuable.

While classical music is a popular staple for orchestras such as ours, we strive to capture the diversity of interests in our region and showcase the amazing range of musical pieces available. Our concerts have included music from movies such as Harry Potter, television shows like Game of Thrones, favorites from science ficton, such as Star Wars and Star Trek—even some disco! There's something for everyone in ECO's growing music library.

Our library includes original pieces as well. In 2019, we debuted two compositions created specifically for us: Evergreen Suite No. 1 by Lou-Chuck F. Donaldson and Mary's Gift by our bassist, Christopher Hartzog. Our Music Director, Marcin Pączkowski, regularly arranges pieces to accommodate and bolster our skill level, and to make the most of our ensemble's instrumentation. Pieces such as Bóg się rodzi and Lulajże, Jezuniu bring a wonderful taste of his native Poland to our region. We are proud of the creativity and dedication of our entire membership.

Evergreen Community Orchestra is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization supported by donations from the community and the monthly dues paid by the membership. No musician is ever turned away because of an inability to contribute financially. We are delighted to welcome all members of our community who appreciate music, enjoy playing, and want to share their talents.
